Fort McKay registered kids in several age groups, with a majority registered in Jr. Novice and Sr. Novice as well as the Atom, Pee Wee, Bantam and Midget teams.

A POW WOW WITH WOW FACTOR

The Gathering Of Nations Pow Wow in Albuquerque is the pow wow of all pow wows. 3800 dancers, 3000 drummers and over 100,000 in all at one pow wow, and this year Fort McKay was in the house again. Dancers performed during the Grand Entry of the Gathering of Nations, held in University Arena (a.k.a. the Pit), at the University of New Mexico.

Fort McKay was well represented this year by Northwind Dancers Feather McDonald and Taylor McDonald. Could you imagine a Grand Entry with that many drummers and dancers?

"Grand Entry was very overwhelming for me; there were a lot of dancers in the arena," says Feather McDonald. "I remember being surrounded by men and women, and how loud the drums were. When I was standing and dancing, tears started to come to my eyes. I felt a strong spiritual connection in myself to the pow wow. I felt at home." When the Fort McKay girls first arrived they were met by Shirley Hill, champion pow wow dancer and regalia maker. Hill was a judge three years ago for Miss Indian World. She declined this year to judge dancing so she could spend more time teaching the girls. She was also a mentor to the first McKay girls who attended the last Gathering Of Nations, and worked with McKay kids with Northwind dancers in the past.

The Fort McKay dancers were introduced to many champion dancers and witnessed new dances that are not practiced in Canada. Shirley Hill explained the protocols, different styles of dancing, regalia, and spiritual significance of each dance.

Other than the po wow, the girls got the opportunity to tour Santa Fe and visit various Art Galleries, which was quite a treat since both are passionate in arts. They also attended Miss Indian World Pageant, visited the Cultural Centre and tried many different types



of Mexican cuisine.

"This is the second time I have brought students to Gathering of Nations. Last time Miranda McDonald, Katherine McDonald, Mary Pike and Kirsten L'Hommecourt attended. Shirley was also instrumental in our huge success at the World Conference on Healing in Hawaii, where three students (Alicia Orr, Mary Pike & Chelsea Orr)

conducted a workshop on the importance of Culture in high school retention for Aboriginal students." Explained Ona Fiddler-Berteig; Mentor for the E-Learning Centre.

"It is significant that the majority of successful students in E-Learning are involved in some aspect of cultural retention or adoption. I sincerely believe that one of the most important things we do at E-Learning is to afford students the opportunity to sometimes discover, develop, maintain and nourish their dignity through cultural pride. With dignity comes a profound understanding of destiny."

"The importance of cultural pride and its attending impact on dignity and destiny of the individual student is critical. Having students attend events where there is pride in culture and a sense of belonging encourages them to reach their full potential. Indspire awards, pow wows, youth conferences... while expensive at times, really in the long term are very cost effective. Students who participate with joy and pride in their cultural heritage become productive members of their communities: they have to live 'cleanly' (no drugs or alcohol) if they dance pow wow and generally as they begin to understand more fully their rich heritage they become more involved with issues that impact their lives."

When asked how she felt about her experience, Taylor explained: "Pow wow dancing and going to pow wows is important because I understand that we are losing our culture slowly. It's up to us, the next generation, to carry on our ways of life. Not only that but pow wow dancing connects us all as people, some of us dance for the same reason and it's to bring joy to our communities and families. Also attending pow wows let's us see more of the world, let's us see more diverse culture."



What Training do the students receive?

Students will receive twelve days of fire training covering such topics as Wildfire Management & Fire Behaviour, Wildfire Preparedness, and Wildfire Operations. In addition students will receive an additional six days of safety training. Upon successful completion of the Wildland Firetack Crew Member Program students will receive a Wildland Firefighting Certificate from the Alberta Government as well as certification in Bear Awareness, Radio Operator (Aeronautical), WHMIS, TDG Air, TDG Ground, 1st Aid, and WTA Chainsaw.



JOIN US MAY 24TH FOR "ON THE RIVER"



Maria Dunn, a Juno-nominated folk musician and songwriter, will be in Fort McKay May 24th to give a live performance.

Fort McKay has experienced tremendous changes in the past 65 years. Ground Zero Productions of Edmonton is creating a live performance called *On The River* that reflects on these changes through song and video, telling this story through the lens of the life of former chief Dorothy McDonald.

Today Fort McKay is surrounded by the oil sands industry. This was not the case in the late 1940s when Dorothy was born. At that time, her family spent much of their time at Moose Lake - hunting, trapping and fishing. Starting when Suncor began production in 1967 and continuing up until today, the community has experienced rapidly accelerating contact with resource extraction.

On The River is a Video Ballad.

It's a live performance that combines new songs from Asani and Maria Dunn with video interviews from people speaking about Fort McKay and about Dorothy.

Maria Dunn is a Juno-nominated folk musician/songwriter based in Edmonton and often compared to Woody Guthrie for her keen social awareness and unvarnished songs about ordinary people. (Website: www.mariadunn.com)

ASANI is an Aboriginal women's trio from Edmonton. They are Debbie Houle, Sarah Pocklington and Sherryl Sewepagaham. This circle of First Nations and Metis women have performed across Canada and internationally at such venues as Carnegie Hall in New York, The Kennedy Centre in Washington D.C. and the Saddledome in Calgary. Asani composed the theme song for the CAMA's in 2005 and the honouring song for the Esquao Awards in 2009.

On The River is presented by Ground Zero Productions, a thirty year old professional theatre company. Ground Zero has toured Maria Dunn's two previous Video Ballads, "GWG: Piece by Piece" and "Troublemakers" throughout Alberta. The company's Artistic Director, Don Bouzek, has created the video segments for this show. His award winning video work has been broadcast by Access-TV and is

featured on many websites.
