After taking a two-year break due to COVID restrictions, Fort McKay First Nation was finally able to host its fourth annual Pow Wow on September 23rd to the 25th. The ceremony brought in many visitors and dancers of all ages from various communities to participate in the event and experience a part of our culture. "It is a pleasure to once again welcome everyone to the Fort McKay Annual Pow

Wow," shared FMFN Chief Mel Grandjamb in a press release.

The Pow Wow was held across the road from the Band Hall at the Arbor and welcomed hundreds of people from surrounding communities. There was no registration fee, and the event was open to anyone who wanted to attend. Shuttle services were also available to help bring people


"It honours both our past and our future."

FORT MCKAY CELER NEW ELSIE FA



It's been a month since school started again, and that means a month since the Elsie Fabian school has been fully operational! After several years of collaboration, planning, coordinating, building the school, and hiring the proper staff, the Elsie Fabian school finally opened its doors to students ranging from kindergarten to grade ten on September 6, 2022. "At the moment, we have over 145 students registered", explained Fort McKay's Director of Education, Christine Gullion.

The school's grand opening was celebrated on September 1, when teachers, students, parents, community members, and Chief and Council united to celebrate a truly historic achievement. During the grand opening, Chief Mel Grandjamb shared the benefits the Elsie Fabian school will bring to our community, "We're focused on our culture, and we're focused on our future."

The Fort McKay First Nation funded the new thirty-five-million-dollar building with the help of the federal government funds and

sponsorships from various oil sands and other construction companies. The school comprises 5,000 square meters of space that includes large classrooms, a library, a full-sized gymnasium with a second-story running track, shop classes, an art room, and a spiritual area where students can go to participate in smudging ceremonies.

What makes this school unique from other schools is that it is operated and managed independently by our community. Its curriculum will offer a modified version of the Alberta education system that incorporates our community's culture and better reflects the needs of our students. Some new programs students can look forward to include Dene and Cree Language classes and culture and Land-Based Education, where they will be able to learn about their rich local history and discover the traditions and stories that come from Dene and Cree culture. In addition to these programs, the school is also planning to host cultural camps at Moose Lake, where students will learn how to trap, hunt, fish, cook,

build shelters, and identify plants and animals. "These new initiatives will help promote and preserve our languages, history, and culture, revitalize our community, and improve our students and our community's overall success," shared Gullion.

And there is also plenty of room to host various sporting and after-school activities which all community members will benefit from. Everyone is encouraged to check out Fort McKay's Facebook page to learn about the various fun after-school activities that are currently happening.

The school was named after the late and memorable Elsie Fabian, a mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother who was engaged and passionate about education. She dedicated over 25 years of her life to education as the Fort McKay Local School Board Committee Chairperson and Northland School Division No. 61 Board of Trustees member. The education department stated "It is our sincerest hope that her tenacity, commitment to life-long learning and her cultural and traditional connectedness will be a lesson and inspiration to many, while at the same time honouring her memory."

FORT MCKAY GROUP OF COMPANIES JOINS VENTURE PARTNERSHIP WITH IMPERIAL OIL

Earlier this year, Fort McKay Group of Companies signed a joint venture deal with Imperial Oil, which Imperial Oil announced as the largest contract they have ever entered with any Indigenous company. "Never before at Imperial have contracts of this scale been provided through Indigenous-owned companies," shared Kearl production manager Jamie Long.

Through Fort McKay Graham, this new venture allows Fort McKay Group of Companies to manage 38 million cubic meters of land through work such as land reclamation, mining support services, and earthwork at Kearl. The terms of these heavy construction projects comprise a \$250 million, five-year contract with Imperial Oil.

"We're excited to bring the combined capabilities of the Fort McKay Group of Companies (FMGOC) and Graham to Kearl," says Sami Saad, chief executive officer at Fort McKay Group of Companies. "This is an opportunity for us to show industry in the region that we have a presence in the mining and heavy equipment space and we are successful, safe, and efficient at delivering quality service."

In addition to financial prospects, this deal may also generate employment opportunities for community members. "Having secured this contract allows our nation and surrounding Indigenous communities to benefit in terms of building employment capacity, investment into education, housing and health," explains Saad.



Have a Safe Halloween!

Halloween is a fun time for children. However when combined with costumes, the weather, and darkness, the excitement of the night can pose danger to little ones. We can't control the weather or the darkness. But we can do a few things to keep Halloween safe.

COSTUMES

- Ensure footwear and costumes fit properly and provide protection against weather conditions.
- Ensure costumes aren't a tripping hazard.
- Add reflective tape to costumes and treat bags. This ensures your child is visible in the dark.
- Choose costumes, beards and wigs labeled "flame-resistant".
- Choose face paint or make-up instead of a mask that can interfere with your child's vision.
- If your child is wearing a mask or a head piece, ensure they can see clearly from the front and both sides, and that it doesn't interfere with their breathing.
- Never allow your child to carry a sharp or dangerous costume prop, such as a knife or sword.

TRICK-OR-TREATING

- Children are safest if they trick-or-treat in groups. Don't let them trick-or-treat alone.
- Accompany your child until you feel comfortable that they are old enough to go without supervision.
- Remind your child that the same safe road rules apply when trick-or-treating as they do any other night. Always walk on sidewalks, and cross the street at crosswalks or street corners only.
- Teach kids to trick-or-treat in well-lit areas, and only visit homes that have outside lights turned on.
- Pack a flashlight in your child's trick-or-treat bag.
- Remind your child never to go inside a stranger's home or car.
- Before your child digs into their treat bag, be sure to inspect all goodies.
- Discard all candy that has a loose, broken, open wrapper, homemade candy or baked goods provided by people you don't know.
- Wash all fruit, and cut it into pieces to inspect it before eating.
