Tayden Shott's shot at Gold!

MFN Chief and Council congratulate Tayden Shott who won a gold medal on July 21st, at the North American Indigenous Games (NAIG)!

Tayden was competing in the 3D Archery Compound 16U Male class. After being in second place through most of the week, he came through in the clutch at the final, winning gold at the biggest Indigenous Games in the world. Tayden, who has been competing for only two years, has already experienced much success. Earlier this year he came second in the Alberta 3D Target Provincial Competition. In 2022 he took gold at the Alberta Indigenous Games 2022, which led to the opportunity to compete in this year's NAIG in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

The North American Indigenous Games, brings together representatives from over 70 Nations to compete and is fiercely competitive.

As if that wasn't enough, the competitors also had to withstand fierce conditions. On the first day they spent more than three hours in the woods in muggy, humid weather with temperatures at +40. Then there was

the thunderstorm on day two, surely a precursor to the weekend when the closing ceremony was cancelled after some of the most severe rain storms and flooding in the history of Nova Scotia.

But those are not Tayden's best memories of the event. His Mother Lolita Ladouceur, who is the Sustainability Department's Community Development Manager,

Constable Rob will be a full-time police presence assigned to Fort McKay, working collaboratively with FMFN's Peace Officers to help protect our residents and the Nation's lands and property.

Constable Rob will be based out of the RCMP office in the FMFN administrative building. He plans to spend most of his time out in the community getting to know community members and doing patrols. He will also be attending many of our on-site events

"Having Rob here full-time in our community, speaks to a commitment from leadership in addressing some key issues," said Darrel Laboucan, "Rob is going to obtain his PACT (Police and Crisis Team) training, which will provide another service to the community when responding to calls for mental health crises."

"Moreover, I am excited about working with Rob on the Protective Services side and enhancing the relationship between Fort McKay First

He was welcomed to the Millbrooke First Nation to drum at the St. Anne's feast and was given several gifts in honour of his kindness and consideration, including a special pin from the NWT Archery Coaches after he helped out some of their team.

In keeping with his outlook on life, Tayden wanted to give special thank yous to his coach Daniel Newton and to those who have helped him along the way, including the sponsorship of the Fort McKay Group of Companies and the Fort McKay First Nation.

Nation and the RCMP," said Darrel. "This new relationship not only means faster response times, but also being able to put a face to a name and building that trust that is vital to addressing issues."

"At the end of the day, Rob is excited to be here and that is exciting for us because the goal at the end of the day is to make Fort McKay safer for community members and visitors," said Darrel. "I am excited about the work we are going to be able to get done together."

"I see my main task as getting to know the community and the people," said Constable Rob. "I believe in understanding as well as enforcement, and I want to serve the community in the best way possible."

Constable Rob is new to the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo, recently moving here with his wife and family to take up his new position in Fort McKay.

Constable Rob is also fairly new to policing, being a 2022 graduate from Depot, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police training facility in Regina. However, he brings significant life experience to his role from 20 years as a businessman and HVAC technician, as well as being a family man, husband, and father.

"I started out as a teenager working

in my dad's refrigeration and HVAC business," he said. "Eventually I became his partner, then I ran my own business."

But he had always wanted to be a policeman and, deciding to pursue his dream, was accepted into the force just before COVID. After some delays related to the pandemic, his training began. He now joins Fort McKay as his first full-time assignment, and he stresses the importance of problem-solving, critical thinking and conflict resolution in his new role.

Sales success for FMFN Business Partner

ort McKay First Nation Chief and Council would like to congratulate Glassmaster Autoglass for its record sales month in June 2023. The company, which is 40% owned by FMFN has been a shining light in the Nation's business portfolio since it was acquired from ATB in 2020.

When FMFN bought into Glassmasters Autoglass, they saw a company with potential. Part of the growth that CEO Roger Tulk has been responsible for is this recognition that it is a business about people: customers, employees, suppliers and shareholders. It's all there in the guiding principles of the company, which focus on Ownership, Leadership, Loyalty, Positivity, and Mastery. And it's why the sales achievement in June is such a big deal.

"The Fort McKay First Nation is an income investor," said Investment leader Stuart Randell, "so growth in the revenue and profitability of Glassmasters Autoglass is good for our portfolio. Profits from the Nation's companies are used to pay for the costs of programs and services in the community of Fort McKay.

Glassmasters Autoglass is a high performing fit for our portfolio."

It's more than the amount, although \$4,000,000 for the month of June far surpassed all projections. The achievement justifies the road that the company has taken these last couple of years. Over and above the guiding principles mentioned above is the mission statement. It doesn't talk about growth, or sales, or profit. It sets out what the company does. Focusing on what they need to do drives all the rest. Windshields don't install themselves, so the company trains installers in Edmonton and Calgary, reaching into First Nations communities to hire staff. They have an Indigenous Inclusion person on the team, and they wear who they are and what they are proud of – they even hang Band Members' art in their business locations.

And it is paying off. The company has expanded into new locations, sales growth is excellent, and the staff are motivated and well-trained, keeping customers safe. The results are there to be seen.





"My two sons have been accepted into Toronto Film School. I am so happy that they will have each other over in that big city. Another place I look forward to visiting."

Be Bear Smart!



If you live near a forested area or treeline, minimize the risk of bear encounters by managing food sources:

• Put out garbage the morning of collection day.

food sources left out by humans.

- Store garbage cans indoors, or clean them regularly.
- Clean your barbecue after every use.
- Collect fruit from trees and gardens quickly, or pick fruit before it ripens.
- Keep meat, fish and oils out of your compost heap.
- Do not put out birdfeeders from April to October.

Without tempting snacks and smells, bears have less reason to wander into your backyard. They will not become habituated to an area if they do not find a food reward.

What should I do if I see a bear in my backyard?

- Do not panic. Do not run.
- Notify the Fort McKay Park Rangers on 780-598-9644 or Fish & Wildlife on 780-743-7200.

It's a good fit for our latest MBA Graduate. as she has broad experience in the Human Resources department, helping to build it into the efficient recruiting and resource tool that it is today. She also ran Education for a while, but her biggest challenge was fighting and beating cancer, after which she decided to get her MBA. Be Ready During Wildfire Season

Summer is not over yet and experts are predicting dry conditions and high temperatures until the fall.

Make sure that your family and the members of your household are prepared and ready to leave.

Have go-bags packed.

Stay informed of weather conditions and advisories in your area.

Remove any fire hazards in and around your home, such as dried out branches, leaves and debris.

Keep a sprinkler that is in good working condition in an accessible location.

Make sure smoke alarms are placed on every level of the home, and preferably in every bedroom.

Consult with your local fire department or a qualified engineer about making your home fire-resistant.

Learn how to turn off the utilities in your residence.

Make sure that your vehicle has enough fuel.

Check on elderly relatives and neighbours to see if they require assistance.

Ensure that pets and/or service animals are accounted for.
